September 19 – It's Time Again To Talk Like a Pirate!

All around the world and even hundreds of miles above it, people celebrate International Talk Like a Pirate Day every September 19.

International Talk Like a Pirate Day is the only holiday on the calendar that encourages people to babble like buccaneers for the sheer, anarchic fun of it. It's been celebrated by millions of people on all seven continents – yes, even at the South Pole – and on the International Space Station!

The holiday was the brainchild (if that's the right word) of John Baur and Mark Summers, two friends from Albany, Ore., who were playing racquetball when, for reasons that aren't clear to either of them now, they started insulting each other in pirate jargon. They decided to start Talk Like a Pirate Day, and picked September 19th because it is Summers' ex-wife's birthday. The date was stuck in his head and he wasn't doing anything with it anymore, so it would be easy to remember, Summers said.

From such unlikely seeds was born an international sensation. The two friends – who now go by the pirate personas of Ol' Chumbucket and Cap'n Slappy have swashed their buckles from the Gulf of Mexico to the Puget Sound, from Los Angeles to Chicago to Philadelphia. They've performed at a glamorous Las Vegas resort, at libraries, bookstores, schools and at several seedy bars.

They have two books out, "The Pirates Life: Unleashing Your Inner Buccaneer," published by Kensington, a hilarious sequel to their first hit, "Pirattitude! So You Wanna Be a Pirate? Here's How!" published by New American Library.

This year the guys will celebrate the holiday more than 5,000 miles apart. Cap'n Slappy will be in Alaska as guest of the University of Alaska, Fairbanks. Ol' Chumbucket moved in 2008 to a sunny island in the Caribbean and can't think of a reason to leave. But they are available for interviews. Talking Like a Pirate – The Beginner’s Course

“Aarr!” is one of what we call “the Five As.” We call them this because that’s the letter they begin with, and our crack mathematics team assures us that there are five of them.

These exclamations are the glue that binds together pirate lingo. Even if you don't know a bunghole from a broadside or a mizzenmast from a maidenhead, you can still give your conversation a little pirate panache by injecting these exclamations into yer landlubber lexicon.

Avast – Stop and give attention. It can be used in a sense of surprise, "Whoa! Get a load of that!" when a beautiful woman walks into the room. "Avast! Check out the bowsprit on that fine beauty!" you might say.

Ahoy – "Hello!" Any inference beyond “Hello!” is simply vocal inflection and has nothing to do with the real meaning of the word.

Aye – "Why, yes, I agree most heartily with everything you just said or did."

Aye aye – "I'll get right on that, sir, as soon as my break is over." We've never heard any similarly colorful expressions for "no," perhaps because pirates were the type you didn't want to say no to.

Arr – This one is often confused with arrgh, which is of course the sound you make when you sit on a belaying pin. "Arr!" can mean, variously, "yes," "I agree," "I'm happy," "I'm enjoying this beer," "My team is winning," "My team is losing," "I saw that television show, it sucked," "I am here and alive" and "That was a clever remark you or I just made." And those are just a few of the myriad possibilities of "Arrr!" It's a little bit like the pirate version of "Oy," that indispensable Yiddish word that has almost as many meanings as there are ways to pronounce it.

Talk Like a Pirate Day: Who are The Pirate Guys?

They didn't have a dream, not even plan. It was more of a whimsical notion. But it was enough to take them from a YMCA racquetball court to radio, television and newspaper appearances around the world, and a staggering 19 million hits on their Web site in just one month.

They are the Pirate Guys, Mark "Cap'n Slappy" Summers and John "Ol' Chumbucket" Baur, two friends from Albany, Ore., who created the holiday, International Talk Like a Pirate Day and took the idea way too far.

Mark Summers was born in Seattle and grew up there, the fourth of five brothers. His maritime background includes his father, who was an engineer on Boeing's Marine System Division working on projects such as the jet foil, and his grandfather and uncles, who were fisherman on Washington's coast. Mark earned a masters degree in social work at Portland State University and works as a school social worker.

John Baur hails originally from Chicago, where he was the only son among eight kids. After earning a bachelors degree in political science, John worked in the daily newspaper business for 23 years. He has also worked as a university science writer and edited an international magazine on hydroponic gardening.

It was during a racquetball game several years ago that they came up with the idea for Talk Like a Pirate Day, probably when one of them strained something and let out an "Aarr!" They chose September 19th because it was Summers' ex-wife's birthday. As he said, "The date was stuck in my brain and I wasn't doing anything with it anymore."

They are aided and abetted in their piratey activities by two women:

- **Tori "Mad Sally" Baur**, John's wife, is an educator and mother who often joins the Pirate Guys on stage and on the road. She is also the videographer who compiles and posts the Pirate Guys' popular youtube.com videos.

- **Pat "Jezebel" Kight** is the Web Wench. A friend and professional Web designer for Oregon Sea Grant (which she explains is "a program of a subunit of a unit of an agency of the Department of Homeland Security") she lends her expertise to maintaining the Pirate Guy's Web site, www.talklikeapirate.com, works hard to stay out of the limelight.

Talk Like a Pirate Day: Odds and ends

- On Sept. 19, 2008, The New York Times Crossword Puzzle featured Talk Like a Pirate Day.
- In 2007 Talk Like a Pirate Day was celebrated on the International Space Station, at the White House, and at the South Pole Research Station.
- Talk Like a Pirate Day has been the subject of questions on *Jeopardy!* and *Hollywood Squares*, and in a recent version of the “Trivial Pursuits” board game.
- John “Ol’ Chumbucket” Baur, his wife, Tori “Mad Sally” Baur, and Mark “Cap’n Slappy” Summers took part in the ABC reality TV show “Wife Swap.” The episode featuring the Baur family was the series’ highest rated for the 2006-2007 season.
- The Marie Curie Cancer Research Center in London makes Talk Like a Pirate Day the center of their fund-raising efforts.
- Cap’n Slappy and Ol’ Chumbucket – the pirate personas of Mark Summers and John Baur, have gone virtual. The two are now characters in the popular online role-playing game “Pirates of the Burnings Sea.” They are, as the designer said, "International Symbols of Pirates Having a Good Time."
- Ol’ Chumbucket, Cap’n Slappy and Mad Sally were guests of honor at CapriCon, a major sci-fi/fantasy convention that in 2008 feature a pirate theme, and other events around the country.
- Besides being an excuse for frivolity at home, school and office, International Talk Like a Pirate Day has been embraced by businesses which use it as the centerpiece for promotions, including
 - Long John Silver's restaurant chain observes Talk Like A Pirate Day
 - Harcourt Children’s Books released its award-winning hit, “How I Became a Pirate,” on Sept. 19 2005. The release was so successful the details of the strategy were written up in Publishers Weekly in a story titled, “Yo Ho Ho and a Marketing Plan,” highlighting the cooperation of the Pirate Guys.
